The Second Dose

On January 21, I received my second dose of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine. Like many people, I heard that the second shot could be a jolt to the system. I can

attest that my immune system was in full swing. Because of the second dose jitters, there is hesitancy on receiving the vaccine altogether. I want to encourage and prepare those who are holdouts and preparing second dose recipients.

It is well-established that vaccine recipients can deal with local and systemic side effects. The local would be swelling, redness, or tenderness at the injection site. I noticed that my deltoid was sore (similar to a good shoulder workout routine). I've seen at least one patient with some lymph node swelling as well. The systemic issues seem to be more frequent with the second dose. Systemically, you can notice fever, fatigue, chills, headache, muscle ache, or joint ache. About 12 to 14 hours after my vaccination, I had chills. I fell asleep on the couch and when I awoke at 2 a.m. to go to bed, I noticed the chills. I took 800mg of Motrin and went to sleep. When I woke up, no chills. I had a slight headache and some fatigue issues. By the 24-hour mark, all of my symptoms were gone.

I offer the following advice to second dosers. First, according to CDC guidelines, you should NOT pre-medicate with analgesics.


There is a question of blunting your immune response. I would tell you that for most people, if/when symptoms begin, medicating with Ibuprofen (maximum of 800 mg every eight hours, if no kidney issues) or Tylenol (no more than two extra strength tabs every six hours) should be sufficient to manage symptoms. Remember that the symptoms are temporary and much better than an admission to the ICU.

We are all looking forward to seeing family and friends sooner rather than later, and this vaccine, combined with a decline in infections, is setting the stage for this to happen.




My Why


As the COVID-19 vaccine is being distributed to Premier Health employees, here's why our providers are getting the vaccine:



CompuNet Introduces Self-ordered COVID-19 PCR and Antigen Testing

CompuNet Clinical Laboratories has introduced COVID-19 PCR and Antigen testing, without the need for a doctor's order, at select locations in Dayton and Cincinnati. Both tests are available to adults and minors (with guardian permission).

Tests without a doctor's order are part of CompuNet's "direct access" service, CompuNet Direct. Individuals purchase tests directly with a credit card and results are sent to the patient. The price for CompuNet Direct's COVID-19 Antigen test is \$60 and the PCR test is \$100.

COVID-19 PCR testing is considered the "gold standard" for accuracy and is recommended for individuals who have COVID symptoms or who believe they have been exposed. COVID PCR testing is highly recommended for those who need travel documentation. Results will be available within the 72-hour required travel window.

COVID-19 antigen testing is typically recommended for an individual who is within five days of having COVID-19 symptoms, and the test provides rapid results within a couple hours.

Patients can order their own COVID-19 testing at the following locations. Appointments are required. When patients arrive at the testing site, they should remain in their car and call the phone number on the sign.

New Neuroscience Technologies

The Premier Health Neuroscience Service Line has long been a leader in advancing new technologies that improve the lives of the patients we serve. This commitment has been demonstrated through our early adoption of telemedicine for stroke patients, endovascular techniques to treat acute stroke patients, laser surgery to treat epilepsy patients, and

numerous clinical trials in partnership with Wright State University. Following this commitment to new technology, Premier Health has joined Insightee's Incisionless Neurosurgery Program and will now treat Essential Tremor and Tremor-dominant Parkinson's disease patients with Focused Ultrasound at Miami Valley Hospital.

Neuravive is an incisionless treatment for essential tremor patients who have not responded to medication. It uses focused soundwaves guided by MRI to treat deep in the brain with no incisions or permanent implants. Essential tremor (ET) is a neurological condition that causes shaking of the hands, head and voice, but it can also cause legs and trunk to shake. Some people even have a feeling of internal tremor. ET is often confused with Parkinson's disease although

it's eight times more common, affecting an estimated 10 million Americans and millions more worldwide. During the Neuravive procedure, ultrasound waves safely pass through the skull without the need for an incision. The ultrasound waves are focused on a small point in the brain (Vim of the thalamus). The temperature at the target rises high enough to create a small ablation or burn, providing a therapeutic effect. The whole procedure is conducted inside an MRI scanner.

This program at Premier Health is under the direction of Daniel Gaudin, MD, Ph.D., division chief of CNSI neurosurgery. The program is scheduled to launch in April 2021.

Premier Health Hospitals Recognized for Higher Quality and Cost-Efficiency in Maternity Care

Anthem Blue Cross and Blue Shield in Ohio has recognized Upper Valley Medical Center and Atrium Medical Center with a Blue Distinction® Centers+ (BDC+) for Maternity Care designation, as part of the Blue Distinction Specialty Care program. Miami Valley Hospital's maternity centers were awarded with a Blue Distinction® Center for Maternity Care designation as part of the program. In addition, Miami Valley Hospital also earned a Blue Distinction Centers+ for Bariatric Surgery designation.


Blue Distinction Centers are nationally designated health care facilities that show a commitment to delivering high quality patient safety and better health outcomes, based on objective measures that were developed with input from the medical community and leading accreditation and quality organizations.

In 2020, the Blue Distinction Centers for Maternity Care program was expanded beyond traditional outcome measures to include assessments of internal quality improvement, data collection and dissemination, and internal protocols that better address clinical quality and equity issues in maternity care. New in the evaluation cycle, facilities must collect race and ethnicity data, have a maternal quality improvement program, commence drills and simulations for adverse events, and have dedicated protocols and procedures for the management of hypertension and hemorrhage. In addition, they must meet clinical outcome metrics at a higher standard than required previously. Facilities eligible for the Blue Distinction Centers for Maternity care show statistically significant differences in key clinical outcomes compared to their peers.

Only those health care facilities that first meet Blue Distinction's nationally established, objective quality measures will be considered for designation as a Blue Distinction Center+.


Premier Health First in Dayton to Offer Fast Breast MRI

Women with dense breasts or those at a higher risk for breast cancer can now choose Fast Breast MRI at Premier Health as a second step (following a mammogram) for breast cancer screening. This new option, which takes 10 minutes or less, is an alternative to a traditional full breast MRI, which typically takes an hour. Premier Health is the first in Dayton to offer this self-pay alternative at four locations.

Fast Breast MRI may increase the accuracy of breast cancer screening in women with dense breasts. For women with dense breasts, the sensitivity of mammography decreases from 84 percent to 25 to 50 percent, which can lead to a later breast cancer diagnosis. A later cancer diagnosis can lead to increased tumor size and a worse prognosis. Women with other elevated breast cancer risk factors may also benefit from Fast Breast MRI, including those who cannot tolerate a traditional full breast MRI due to the exam's length.

Fast Breast MRI is a new exam and currently not covered by insurance, including Medicare and Medicaid. The self-pay cost is \$400 and a physician's order is required. The exam is available at Atrium Medical Center, Miami Valley Hospital, Miami Valley Hospital North, and Upper Valley Medical Center.

Miami Valley Hospital was the only recipient of the award in the Dayton area.



He presented a similar program at the Jan. 26 Troy Rotary Club meeting and is providing periodic updates to city leaders and other elected officials. Also, at Troy Rotary meetings in January, Dr. Kanagy presented a program on the COVID-19 vaccine, and Travis Grasley, director of cardiopulmonary and sleep services, provided a program on cardiopulmonary services at UVMC.

In other community relations activities, UVMC was a sponsor of the Piqua Arts Council Kickoff Celebration held virtually on Jan. 19 and was the lead sponsor of the Piqua Chamber of Commerce 75th Anniversary Celebration held virtually on Jan. 21.

UVMC employees were provided with an update on progress of the Employee Wellness Center, which will occupy space adjacent to the cardiac and pulmonary rehab addition that was completed last year. Scheduled to open in the spring, the 1,235-square-foot center will offer an exercise facility and wellness/fitness activities for hospital staff.

Premier Health and Wayne HealthCare Expand Telehealth Partnership

Premier Health and Wayne HealthCare are expanding their telehealth partnership to include TeleIntensivist coverage, a telehealth program that provides access to intensivists through video consultation. An intensivist is a board-certified physician who provides special care for critically ill patients and has advanced training and experience in treating their complex health needs.

Premier Health's network of intensivists (critical care telemedicine specialists) will work with on-site physicians and advanced practice providers at Wayne HealthCare to help remotely manage critically ill patients in the ICU using a telehealth cart with audio and visual connectivity. Providers will be able to review real-time bedside monitors and clinical data. Their experience and guidance, provided remotely, will allow for the successful treatment of patients that previously would have been transferred elsewhere.

Telemedicine services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The TeleIntensivist program complements other telemedicine services currently provided by Premier Health, including:

- TeleStroke: board-certified neurologists work virtually with the staff at Wayne HealthCare to ensure rapid evaluation and treatment after a stroke to maximize rehabilitation and recovery for patients;
- TeleEEG: board-certified neurologists diagnose and monitor seizures and other brain disorders.
