Premier Health and Wayne HealthCare Expand Telehealth Partnership

Premier Health and Wayne HealthCare are again expanding their telehealth partnership to include teleneurology services, called NEUROne, for patients who have nonemergency neurological conditions.

The NEUROne program provides patients who have neurological conditions greater access to nonemergency evaluation and care. Premier Health is the only health system in the Dayton area that offers NEUROne teleneurology services.

Through the program, Wayne HealthCare will have access to inpatient teleneurology services – in other words, remote telehealth access to the expertise of a neurologist for a far greater range of neurological conditions than in the past.

Suitable for patients with general neurological conditions, including headache, seizure, stroke and neuro-muscular disorders, NEUROne is in addition to the Premier Health Telestroke Network that already provides emergent services for acute stroke treatment at Wayne HealthCare.

Private and secure NEUROne video conferencing allows patients, family, and the bedside care team to see and speak with

Premier Health's Clinical Neuroscience Institute neurologists in real time. This collaboration can optimize diagnosis and treatment by providing a high level of specialized care.

The NEUROne program complements other telemedicine services currently provided by Premier Health, including:

- TeleIntensivist: a board-certified intensivist, who has advanced training and experience in treating the complex health needs of critically ill patients, is virtually available to assist the staff at Wayne HealthCare in managing patients with higher acuity needs;
- TeleStroke: board-certified neurologists work virtually with the staff at Wayne HealthCare to ensure rapid evaluation and treatment after a stroke to maximize rehabilitation and recovery for patients;
- TeleEEG: board-certified neurologists diagnose and assist in monitoring seizures and other brain disorders.

Building Market Distinctiveness for the Surgery Service Line

Premier Health's 2023 strategic plan has six main themes. The first of those themes, referred to as strategy one, is to "build market distinctiveness." This plan defines building market distinctiveness as reclaiming market share by doubling-down on areas with disproportionate opportunity to capture growth in our eight county region. To accomplish this, the strategy led us to a system-wide service line approach with an emphasis on growth, strategy, and business development.

At the beginning of 2021, Premier Health established a brand-new service line structure when we introduced the surgery

service line. As we evaluated the approach to surgery as a service line, we decided our best opportunity to meet the goals of strategy one was to put our focus on program development.

- Heartburn and Reflux Program: In collaboration with radiology, gastroenterology, primary and specialty care, we are working to build a program around fore-gut and reflux treatment solutions. This program will include physicians from across the system and will be marketed to the community as an industry leader in reflux treatments as well as providing the highest level of service.
- Medical and Surgical Weight Loss: With a strong programmatic foundation, we identified an opportunity within the market to expand Premier Weight Loss Solutions (PWLS). The physician network and physician recruitment team successfully recruited two new surgeons to the program. In partnership with the care team and leadership at PWLS, we are poised to grow the program through various channels, including educating patients already using Premier Health services, contracting with employers, direct-to-consumer digital marketing, and community educational programming.
- Extended breast surgeons to Atrium Breast Center: We created a one-stop shop with enhanced collaboration with the breast imaging team and nurse navigation. The outcome will increase market share through the packaging of services at one site as we communicate the program to consumers as a complete breast care center. This effort is supporting the Women's Health Center of Strategic Growth at Atrium as well as in alignment with the oncology service line efforts across the system from both a connectivity and commonality of services perspective.

As we look ahead to 2022, in addition to further program development, the surgery service line is also supporting other specialty areas with significant opportunity as defined by market analysis, including gastroenterology. We are supporting the coordination of a system strategy approach to gastroenterology services to enhance coverage, increase outpatient elective volume, retain procedural volume, and gain market share.

We look forward to continuing to support Premier Health's strategic initiatives and welcome input and engagement from our surgeons and physicians.

Atrium Medical Center Leads Ohio in Specialized Lung Procedure




Atrium Medical Center leads Ohio in the number of patients who have participated in the Zephyr Endobronchial Valve procedure.

the first minimally invasive procedure that treats patients with severe COPD and emphysema.

The Zephyr Valves are placed during a bronchoscopic procedure, making this surgery minimally invasive – no knives, no stitches. Within the first day, many patients begin seeing some improvement. The valve, a device shaped like a pencil eraser, is inserted into the lobes of the damaged lungs without surgery.

Jamie Yunger, MD, medical director of Atrium's Intensive Care Unit, performed the first Zephyr Endobronchial Valve procedure in the Dayton and Cincinnati region in 2019 and was the second physician in Ohio to perform this procedure.

The Zephyr Endobronchial Valve can offer patients significant benefits, including improvements over baseline in lung function as well as improvements in



exercise capacity, according to a recent study by Pulmonx Corp., a global supplier of minimally invasive treatments for severe lung disease.

Patients from as far as Pennsylvania and Kentucky have driven to Atrium Medical Center to have the Zephyr Valves inserted. According to a recent study by the American Lung Association, 16.4 million Americans, or 6.6 percent of adults, were diagnosed with COPD, chronic bronchitis, or emphysema.

CompuNet Introduces New Coagulation Testing for Inpatient Population

APIXABAN (LAB 6431) and RIVAROXABAN (LAB 6432)

As of October 12, 2021, Premier Health hospitals can now perform testing for the direct oral anticoagulant drugs' (DOAC) levels of Apixaban (Eliquis) and Rivaroxaban (Xarelto) for the inpatient population. Both direct oral anticoagulant drugs have a strong effect directly on Factor XA in the coagulation cascade. They are often used for cardiac and

stroke disease indications. Monitoring the presence or absence of these drugs becomes urgent in trauma or surgical situations. In conjunction with Premier Health pharmacy, CompuNet has created a DOAC Reversal order set in EPIC. This will order the test STAT to see if these drugs are present or absent and to help determine if reversal agents are needed. This coagulation test is a chromogenic assay; therefore, possible interference can be a vivid plasma color. In addition, other

direct oral anticoagulant drugs as well as unfractionated and low molecular weight heparin can interfere with this test.

Upper Valley Medical Center (UVMC) has earned Primary Stroke Center status from The Joint Commission.



Primary Stroke Center Certification recognizes health care organizations that provide clinical programs across the continuum of care for stroke. The certification evaluates how organizations use clinical outcomes and performance measures to identify opportunities to improve care, as well as to educate and

prepare patients and their caregivers for discharge.

UVMC underwent a rigorous, unannounced onsite review this past summer, during which a team of Joint Commission reviewers evaluated compliance with related certification standards. Premier Health Penicillin Allergy Testing Clinic

Premier Health has launched a penicillin allergy testing clinic at Miami Valley Hospital to update, or remove if appropriate, patients' penicillin allergy labels because these antibiotics are preferred for most infections and have few negative side effects. The clinic is the first of its kind in the Dayton area.

The clinic will reach out to patients who are scheduled for a procedure at a Premier Health facility and have an allergy to penicillin (or other antibiotic) listed in their medical record. The benefits of being tested will be explained, along with the possible negative effects of non-penicillin antibiotics.

The patient will be invited to answer a few questions to determine whether the allergy label should stay in the medical record or if the patient would be a candidate for an allergy test at the clinic. If the patient is a candidate, the test will be explained and encouraged, and options will be provided to schedule the test.

Premier Blood and Cancer Center (PBCC) is our physician-led medical oncology program, providing patients quality care maintained via MD Anderson and Commission on Cancer certification. PBCC provides an in-network cancer care option for Premier Health's cancer patients. Our medical oncologists and hematologists use a variety of advanced therapies, treatments, and procedures, while collaborating with other specialists to develop an individualized plan of care for patients. PBCC provides new patient consults within 24 to 72 hours and has options for both in-person and video visits. PBCC providers work directly with the hospital infusion centers to arrange treatment for your patients.

When patients are hurting but busy, they can get care for surprise injuries and nagging bone, joint and muscle pain at Premier Orthopedics walk-in clinics at our Centerville, Englewood, and Vandalia locations. Patients are seen by boardcertified, fellowship-trained orthopedic and sports medicine specialists and specialty-trained physician assistants – the same Premier Orthopedics team who cares for athletes from University of Dayton, Wright State University, and many area high schools. The team treats adults and youth patients for sprains and strains, dislocations, breaks and fractures, sports injuries, work injuries, joint pain, and muscle pain. We will provide a diagnosis and follow-up treatment plan, saving precious time. Patients can even get X-rays right there. They just need to walk in or make an appointment.
